South Clifton Parish Council

Since the Winter newsletter South Clifton Parish Council held meetings in December and January.

The main issues under discussion continue to be the One Earth Solar Farm proposals which the Council and 98% of South Clifton residents objected to, and the Flooding at the beginning of January.

One Earth Solar Farm

The action group opposing the solar farm proposals, as they stand, has been busy lobbying councillors and MPs. They have had an article and several photos published in the Newark Advertiser and a visit from Robert Jenrick to part of the proposed site. Your council was asked to provide a detailed 'Environmental Impact' report which was sent to the Planning Inspectorate (Secretary of State) in December.

We now await the revised proposals from One Earth, due in the next few months. They have said that they will, once again, hold a Public Consultation, so you should look out for details of this in your post. At this stage of the process, the Parish Council will be officially consulted and will be able to voice the collective opinion of our villagers. Please get in touch if you need any more information about this.

Village Flood

The January meeting was attended by some of the residents sadly impacted by the flooding on Back Street. The discussion centred around what the community and Parish Council can do to mitigate future events. Given the flooding was the first time South Clifton has been affected in living memory the coordination of response was high on the list of future actions.

So far, we have appointed a flood warden (James Goode) who will work with Gill Cobham and Adam Faux as well as four volunteers from North Clifton forming a joint 'Flood Group'. We have also arranged to co-ordinate with the Girton Flood Group and the, newly formed, North Scarle Flood Group.

The flooding, as far as we can ascertain so far, was due to a number of factors:

- A problem with the sewage pumping station on Front Street as well as some blocked drains;
- Ditches and Dykes not being properly maintained;
- Leaf and debris build up in the gutters and drainage grates;
- The one-way flap covering the water pipe that drains into the Bubble Dyke not closing fully, thus allowing flood water from the Trent into the village;
- Possible broken pipes underground?

Several of these problems have been sorted. The pumping station is now functioning correctly and the drains cleared. The gutters have been swept, albeit not very well but we are awaiting a return visit. With the help of Linda Dales, our District Councillor, the Internal Drainage Board have checked that their drains and dykes are clear and she has also been in touch with the riparian landowners responsible for the dykes on Vicarage Road to ensure they are aware of their responsibilities. We are awaiting a camera survey by Severn Trent, to pinpoint any underground problems as well as repair the one-way flap.

The Flood Group are working on an Emergency Plan for the future and also a resilience store where equipment such as aqua sacks, brushes, spades etc can be kept for easy access, should they be needed in the future.

Safer Neighbourhood Group

There were two meetings of the Safer Neighbourhood Group in November and January attended by Gill and Andrew Coverdale (our Neighbourhood Watch volunteer). This group led by Linda Dales, Police and a number of Newark & Sherwood communities reviews incidents in each community and is the opportunity for our representatives to report issues and request help. Thankfully South Clifton did not have anything of significance to report in these meetings but you are all encouraged to highlight issues of concern to Gill or Andrew so they can be raised at the next meeting on 30 April 2024.

A leisurely walk on a new path to the Clifton Hill trig point with some of the best views in East Notts?

Since the last Friends of Trent Vale Trail (FoTVT) newsletter update the charity trustees and volunteers have been working hard to raise funds to complete the final 1400 metre section through Spalford and South Clifton connecting at Coal Yard Lane. It is pleasing to report that the FoTVT have been awarded national government grants, levelling up funds, administered by Newark & Sherwood District Council (NSDC). The support of our district councillor and several others at NSDC have been crucial to win the funding, as of course is the support from landowners. The amount awarded should be enough to finally connect South Clifton to provide a safe route for cyclists, horse riders, walkers, and wheelers from Coal Yard Lane to the Trent villages and onward to Newark. The current expectation is for the work to upgrade the surface, install fencing and gates to start in April 2024. On completion the section will be adopted by Nottinghamshire County Council whose Countryside Access team have been a long-time supporter of the Trent Vale Trail.

Completion of the trail presents the opportunity for our community cyclists, horse riders, walkers, and wheelers to safely (no A1133!) travel to Girton, Besthorpe, Collingham and Newark without need for a car.

North Clifton Parish Meeting

At the parish meeting on 30th November 2023, 14 parishioners met in the sports pavilion at South Clifton.

One Earth Solar Farm. Perhaps not surprisingly the solar farm project created a lot of discussion, despite there being an action group working on behalf of the Parish Meeting and neighbouring Councils. The meeting had previously tried to take a neutral stance until such time as the full plans for One Earths solar farm became public knowledge, but the meeting decided that this should be changed and the meeting is now firmly against any solar farm development within the Parish. The Action group, led by David White, continues to fight against the project, you may have seen the photo of the group meeting Robert Jenrick MP in the Newark Advertiser. It is anticipated that One Earth will have gone to formal consultation before the next Parish mag comes out so keep a look out for more info on Cliftonites and village noticeboards.

Carols on the green. About 30 people attended the now traditional Carols, enjoying mince pies, sausage rolls and mulled wine, whilst admiring the new lights on the Christmas tree. A convivial evening

Flooding. Whilst better off than many, New Year brought the village back to life with a jolt as properties at the bottom end of Trent Lane became threatened by water running off the land that could not drain away due to the swollen Trent. Thankfully

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I am sure enjoyed by all who attended.

people rallied round finding pumps and sandbags so no houses flooded, only out buildings. The village owes a massive thanks to the volunteers who quickly set up a Flood WhatsApp group, followed by a team of pump attendants who manned the pump in two hour shifts for 96 hours. There is no doubt if people hadn't reacted in the way they did certainly one house, perhaps more would have been flooded. Lessons have now been learnt and the village has since appointed two flood wardens, two coordinators and is in the process of organising a "resilience store" where people can get emergency

sandbags, aquasacs and the like. We are also trying to establish ownership of various drains, outlets and flood defences to make contacting authorities easier in the future.

Ownership of the green. Our claim for registering the green is slowly moving on. Following contact with the Open Space Society we now have forms for people to fill in which are aimed at providing evidence that the village has used the green for over 20 years without challenge. People who attend the meeting have had their forms already, but if you don't attend and would like the form please contact us using the email address below. The forms are available as hard copies or a PDF file.



Village party. This is due to go ahead in the evening of July 6th on the grassed area at the junction of Trent lane and Back lane, North Clifton. (Crofts Meadow). North Clifton Arts festival is taking place on the site during the daytime on Saturday and Sunday but the site is dedicated to the party in the evening. Bring your own picnic. The Sports club are providing a licenced bar and there will be games for the children and more agile adults! The arts festival is still in the planning stage but initial enquires look good and the event will be an ideal venue for local artists to showcase their work.

Defibrillator training and VETS system. By the time you read this another Defib training session will have taken place at the village hall. Stephen Fox has very kindly offered to take over the admin for the VETS system, (Volunteer emergency telephone system) which is community-run system which enables up 10-15 "good neighbours" to assist pending the arrival of the emergency services. A local number is used as a single point of contact using "Hunting-Group" technology to ring all volunteers phone numbers simultaneously. 

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



North Clifton Primary School and the Second World War (1939-1945)





Our older pupils in the Owls Class (ages 7 to 11 years) have been studying the Second World War, and as part of this topic we have been looking at the impact the War had on our school and local community. We are extremely lucky to still have two very valuable historical documents relating to our school in our possession. The first is our School Admissions book opened in 1909, and the second is the School Log Book, which consists of two volumes, written by the incumbent Headmaster/Mistress recording key events in the School's life. These records have given the children a tantalising glimpse of the past, but sadly have also raised more questions than we've had answers for! Nevertheless, it has been an intriguing 'journey' and we thought you might be interested to hear what the children have discovered.

The first reference to the Second World War was not made on the day war was declared against Nazi Germany on 3rd September 1939, but in an entry made on 22nd August in the Log Book, when the then Head Mistress, Miss Ada Woodhead wrote: "The Junior children had their gas masks fitted after playtime this afternoon." This short matter-of-fact statement is typical of all entries in the Log Book, purely factual statements, with no comment, emotion or wider context; indeed the start and end of the Second World War was not even commented on.

An entry made on 31st August 1939, stated: "The School was closed this afternoon in accordance with the Emergency Orders for the Evacuation of Children." – this was when 1.5 million children and other 'vulnerable citizens' were evacuated from 'at risk' areas across the country. It was also a day when: "A supply of coke arrived." – a routine event but one always noted the Log Book. School re-opened on 14th September, starting with confirmation of further delivery of coke and the following: "The senior boys are making a simple shelter piling sand and sods in front of the hedge in the Playing field to use in case of an Air Raid Warning." It is difficult to believe today that building a make-shift air raid shelter could have been a serious activity, however, there is nothing in the Log Book to suggest this was anything but a very serious undertaking. There is no evidence to show where the shelter was built, or a description as to what it may have looked like when finished, but our current pupils, who know the grounds and lay of the land very well, certainly have their theories! Was it ever used? Our records don't confirm this either way, but they do tell us that there were 2 or 3 air raid warnings during school opening hours including one on 13th December 1940 when the Log Book records: "An air raid warning from 10.40am to 11.15am."

Perhaps the greatest impact the Second World War had on our School was the arrivals of evacuees. The first evacuees arrived at our School on 18th September 1939 – the Kirkby family of 3 children aged between 10 and 14 years, from Hull. These children are recorded in the Admissions Book as "Evacuees Unofficial", and presumably ended up in our local villages because they had family connections. There were several children during the War who fell under this category coming from local cities such as Sheffield and Hull. The real change, however, comes in June 1940. On 10th and 11th June 1940, the Admissions Book

records the admission of 24 "Evacuees Official" from Great Yarmouth, with the Log Book confirming the children arrived in the villages on 3rd June 1940, accompanied by two Infant Teachers, a Mrs Rose Fowler and Miss Amy Whyness.

Using a copy of an original letter, the children learnt that the parents of Great Yarmouth had less than 24 hours to decide whether or not to evacuate their children to an unknown destination in either "the Midlands or in Wales." The Great Yarmouth Education Committee issued letters via the local schools on 28th May 1940, stating that: "This form must be returned to the School by 9 o'clock on Wednesday 29th May." A list of items to gather was provided, and the families were given 4 days to prepare. Over 1,200 children left Great Yarmouth on five trains on 2nd June heading for Nottinghamshire, and it seems highly likely that our evacuees were amongst them. A newspaper article we discovered in the Newark Advertiser, dated Wednesday 12th June, records the arrival of 227 evacuees in Newark who were then transported by Lincolnshire Road Car Buses to the surrounding villages. Arrangements for the evacuees had been coordinated by Mrs T. L. C. Curtis of Collingham with the help of a billeting officer from each village. A further newspaper article reports the readiness of all local villages, but makes an appeal for mattresses.


Sadly, we weren't able to find any memoirs or records to tell us who our villages' billeting officers were, or to show what life was like for the evacuees once they had arrived in North and South Clifton or Spalford. We do know though, that our School admitted 50 evacuees over the course of the War, coming from as-far-a field as London; Portsmouth; Dartmouth; Romford; Bristol; Hull and Sheffield. The Admissions Book shows that virtually all evacuees returned to where they had originally come from. Some only stayed a few weeks, but the majority, particularly those from Great Yarmouth, stayed for the duration of the War. The longest stay was by two brothers who were registered in our school for just over 5 years, returning home to Great Yarmouth (which had been quite badly bombed during the War) on 6th July 1945.

As well as looking at what our school records could tell us about the War, the children were lucky enough to have access to documents about a local young man, who had lived in Collingham and who is connected with South Clifton through his niece Anne Akrill. Anne's Uncle, Billy Akrill was an RAF navigator who sadly died the day after his 21st birthday in 1943 on a mission to bomb the Krupps Factory in Essen, Germany. The children found Billy's story fascinating, and used some of the 100 letters to his family and best friend, the telegram, his medals, condolence letters and a host of other historical documents to piece together his life and experiences, including the events of his very last mission when he was tragically recorded as "missing in operations" on the night of 12-13 March 1943. This research was later followed by a trip to the International Bomber Command Centre where, amongst some to other super activities, the children were able to find Billy's name on the memorial there. Anne Akrill also came into school and spent some time with the children, telling them more about Billy and answering their questions - they were keen to talk about him and to tell her what they had learnt.

The children have really enjoyed this topic, and were stunned to learn that search lights and air raid shelters had been built in the villages, that prisoners of war had been housed locally and worked in our villages, and that bombs had even been dropped here. We owe our thanks to several people in the village for their support in helping us to find relevant information as we put these lessons, but particularly to Anne Akrill for entrusting such special family treasures to us for a while. We don't think the children will forget Billy's story.

We are very keen to build a picture of our School through time, and will definitely being using our records again to look at other period from the past. 

Doddington ~ Jerusalem Circular

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OS Explorer Map 272
Easy walk using field and tarmac tracks with no stiles. Can be muddy in places.



- 1. Starting at the Doddington Hall car park opposite the Church, take the path by the side of a small brick building to the right of the car park entrance (away from Doddington Hall). Follow this path through a gap in the hedge onto Kennel Lane following this lane as it bears right (ignore the entrance to cycle track on left) and continue to the end. Pass through a small metal gate onto a field path, continue ahead along this path by the side of a field and then a wood until you meet another metal gate. Go through this and carry on straight ahead passing a large pond and works on your right.
- 2. At a T-junction in the path, turn left onto a bridleway for a short distance and turn left again joining the 647 cycle track. Walk along the track for about ½ mile until you see on your left a tarmac track with metal 5 bar gate.
- 3. Turn left onto this track for a 1 mile back to Doddington Hall and the start of the walk.



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


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We are open every Saturday between 10 am and 12 noon at the sports pavilion on Coal Yard Lane, South Clifton.

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

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Mill Field update

Hello everyone. Here is an update on the Mill Field community project in South Clifton.

Mill Field is the field opposite the Coronation Hall - so-called because it used to be the location for a windmill. The windmill was the 'post' type of mill with a timber building and sails on top of a brick base. Over a century ago there were also mills like this in Spalford and Besthorpe. There is one picture of the mill in existence (shown on this page).

The field has been empty for a number of years. In 2022 a few South Clifton residents formed a volunteer group - the Friends of Mill Field - to put together some plans for the field after the village was offered the opportunity to do this. Last year we had a proposal accepted by Newark & Sherwood District Council (with the support of the Parish Council) for a community project including increasing public access, hedge and tree planting, some allotments, a community orchard and some areas managed for wildlife. There will also be



an area preserved to recognise the heritage feature of the footprint of the old mill.

Although the plans were approved some time ago there has been a delay to the handover of the field. This is because Newark & Sherwood Council need to undertake a more thorough clean-up of the area that is proposed for food growing before we can take it on. The council have been out to inspect the site and we are currently awaiting confirmation that this further cleanup will happen and a date for this work to take place. Once we have this we will be back in touch with you all to let you know including to ask for expressions of interest for allotments (we have already had a few). We intend to apply for a grant for fencing and water supply and there will be some ground preparation



to ensure the allotments are ready for use. We hope to be able to do some tree planting and hedge repairs and planting over the winter of 24/25 with the support of the Sherwood Forest Trust.

If you'd like to join our volunteer email list please contact me at adamcormack01@gmail.com There is no obligation to do anything and there will be all sorts of tasks to get involved with over the next few months. We'll be working on plans, potentially doing some clearing up/cleaning of the site and working on fundraising bids to help with the work we want to do. There is a public footpath that runs through the site so do have a look if you're in the village. It is a lovely space with mature trees in the hedges, an old pond in the far corner and full of wildflowers in the summer months. We are looking forward to taking it on and managing it for the benefit of the village.

Patient Participation Group News

Hello to everyone from your PPG (Patient Participation Group) at Collingham Medical Centre; serving Collingham and several surrounding villages. We are volunteers who meet regularly to share information and support the work of the medical centre staff.

At our most recent meeting we were pleased to welcome the pharmacist John Hiddick who shared some updates about Collingham Pharmacy. The pharmacy can now offer services for the following:

- Sinusitis (12 years and over)
- Sore throat (5 years and over)
- Acute Otis Media/Ear infection (1-17 years old)
- Infected insect bite (1 year and over)


